It aims to monitor nutrition security at the local level based on the performance of the Local Nutrition Committees (LNC) and Local Nutrition Focal Points (LNFP) in the previous year.</p>	<p>In the Province of Isabela, the Provincial Nutrition Evaluation Team is composed of the Provincial Nutrition Committee – Technical Working Group (PNC-TWG) represented by the offices of IPHO, OPA, PVET, PPDO, PBO, PSWDO, DILG, and DEPED</p> <p>MELLPI Pro utilizes a computerized tool to rate the performances in the different evaluating indicators under the following dimensions: (a) Vision and Mission, (b) Nutrition Laws and Policies, (c) Governance and Organizational Structure, (d) Local Nutrition Committee Management Functions, (e) Nutrition Interventions / Services, and (f) changes in the nutritional status. Rating of said performances are highly dependent on key reference documents prepared by the respective LNCs, ie Local Nutrition Action Plans, minutes of meetings, documentation reports, and masterlist of beneficiaries, among others.</p>
